BSU SCIENTISTS TEACH AT MK NATURE CENTER

Brian Stark and Micah Scholer are REAL scientists teaching at the MK Nature Center. Both are graduate students at Boise State University and are Graduate Fellows in the Graduate, Kindergarten – 12th grade Program (GK-12). The GK-12 program is a national program funded by the National Science Foundation. Boise State University received a 2.26 million dollar grant 3 years ago to place graduate student scientists in community learning centers in Boise for five years. This year, MK Nature Center was selected to receive two of the Fellows to help us teach science!



Micah is a Raptor biologist, specifically looking at how best to determine the presence of owls in an Idaho forest by using woodpecker presence as one indicator. Some owls are cavity nesters, but no owls make their own cavities! Woodpeckers, on the other hand, do make their own cavities which are often later used by owls. Because owls are nocturnal and illusive, it is difficult for biologists to count them. Micah is attempting to find out if the presence of woodpeckers can *better* determine the presence of owls.



Brian is a geomorphologist studying windblown sediment in the Boise Foothills. “Geomorphology is the scientific study of landforms and the processes that shape them, and more broadly, the evolution of processes controlling the topography of any planet. Geomorphologists seek to understand why landscapes look the way they do, to understand landform history and dynamics, and to predict future changes through a combination of field observation, physical experiment, and numerical modeling” (Wikipedia).

We look forward to having Brian and Micah on our team through June, 2011!



ATHENA-OUR NEW RESIDENT!

The Nature Center is unlike the zoo in that most of our wildlife is WILD and not in cages. There are a few exceptions. We currently have a salamander, a gopher snake, a turtle, and two American Kestrels. All of these animals were injured and cannot be released into the wild. We recently received a new resident! Athena is a small burrowing owl that came to us from a raptor rehabilitator.



Cathie Havlina and her daughter Gillian Havlina delivered Athena to MK Nature Center on September 28th. Athena hit a windshield at night in early September. Havlina, a raptor rehabilitator, nursed the bird back to health, but the wing was broken and calcified causing permanent damage.
