OH MY COD, THERE'S A NEW STURGEON IN TOWN!

On December 3rd, Dave Danner, one of our local taxidermists brought us *Lota lota* (a.k.a. burbot, eelpout, ling, and lawyer). It's a beautiful fish and a beautiful taxidermy job (see photo below left). *Lota lota* (what great scientific name!) is the only freshwater cod fish in the world; worldwide, there are about 60 species in the cod fish family. The burbot is circumpolar in distribution; meaning, mostly above the 40th parallel in North America (mostly Canada) and Eurasia, but it is native to the Kootenai River, Idaho. Adult burbot average about two feet in length. They are nocturnal predators that will eat just about any form of meat, insects, and other aquatic invertebrates and a wide variety of fishes. Burbot spawn in mid-winter, often under the ice, in what has been described as a "writhing ball" of 10-12 individuals.

On another note, with the help of our co-workers at the Hagerman State Fish Hatchery, a 7 foot, 15 year old, 200 pound sturgeon was released into the pond on November 18th (see photo below right). Susan "dances with sturgeon" got in the water with the big guy to ensure a safe release: that was fun to watch. The beast, as I like to call him, seems to have taken to his new digs in a big way.

The poor guy must find the nature center pond spacious after spending his entire life in a raceway; he'd grown too big to even turn around in that place.



MASTER NATURALIST PROGRAM OFFERED IN 2010

MK Nature Center, the Foothills Learning Center and the Idaho Botanical Garden will be partnering once again this year to offer another round of the Idaho Master Naturalist Program.

The Idaho Master Naturalist Program's mission is to develop a corps of well-informed volunteers to actively work toward stewardship of Idaho's natural environment.

The Sagebrush-Steppe Chapter of the Idaho Master Naturalist Program is currently seeking participants. This program is composed of 40 hours of training and 40 hours of volunteer service for certification.

Training sessions will be held January-April on most Tuesdays from 9:30 am to 12:30 pm. The cost of the program is \$60. Volunteer service can be performed anytime throughout the year. Participants learn about Idaho's birds, mammals, geology, ecology, plants, and wetlands.

4 WAYS TO SUPPORT IDAHO'S WILDLIFE IN 2010



#1

Buy a hunting license. That is right, people who hunt in Idaho are the only people contributing to the conservation of game animals such as elk, deer and mountain lion. Idaho Department of Fish and Game works to sustain game animals for Idahoans now and for future generations to enjoy.

#2

Buy a fishing license. Anglers in Idaho pay for all fish stocking, habitat restoration, fisheries research, and some educational programs.

#3

Buy an Idaho Wildlife License Plate! Make your car look good AND support Idaho's nongame animals. Did you know that over 89% of all Idaho's Wildlife cannot be hunted, fished, or trapped and these same animals receive NO funds from the sale of hunting and fishing licenses? Choose from the bluebird, elk, or trout plate.

Do your taxes right! None of your Idaho tax money goes to fish and wildlife conservation! So, do it right, and make a donation to the Nongame Wildlife Conservation Fund on line 37 of your Idaho State Tax Form. ANY amount is appreciated!
