Agenda Item: Wolf hunting and trapping proposals **Bureau Chief Approval:**

Background:

The Idaho Fish and Game Commission has unique authority to establish harvest seasons (including season dates, bag limits, size, sex, and harvestable species) via proclamation, rather than through IDAPA rulemaking. The Commission considers proposed changes for season setting and publishes proclamations biennially in March of odd-numbered years for big game species, including wolves.

The Commission set the 2017-2018 and 2018-2019 hunting and trapping seasons for wolves at their March 2017 meeting. Although the Department focusses efforts on the season-setting process on a biennial cycle, the Commission has the authority to consider proposals and make adjustments annually if necessary due to fire, bad winter weather, a disease event, or other factors.

At their March 2018 meeting, the Commission considered a proposal to modify the 2018-2019 wolf hunting seasons to extend the season in Game Management Units in southern Idaho that currently close on March 31, and have an open spring black bear season, by 1 month to close on April 30 (Fig. 1). The extension of the wolf hunting season into the spring would allow the opportunity for wolf harvest during the overlap with spring black bear seasons that open in April.

Further, the Commission considered proposals submitted jointly by the Idaho Trapper's Association, Upper Snake River Trappers of Idaho, Intermountain Fur Harvesters, Foundation For Wildlife Management, East Idaho Houndsmen Association, Idaho Houndsmen Association, and Idaho Farm Bureau for potential modifications to the 2018-2019 trapping season. The proposal would open wolf trapping seasons (including snares) in Units 2 (open entire unit), 32A, 33, 66, and 69, preferably Oct 1 – Mar 31, and expand the current trapping season dates in Units 4, 4A, 39, 43, and 44 by moving the opening date to Oct 1 and run through Mar 31 (Fig. 2).

At the March 22, 2018 meeting, the Commission voted to defer action and further discussion on the proposals to a later date.

Statutory Authority and/or Policy Issues:

Idaho Code 36-104 grants authority to the Commission to promulgate rules for the taking of wildlife consistent with state policy.

Public Involvement Process:

Recommendations for the 2017-2018 and 2018-2019 wolf trapping seasons that were set in March 2017 resulted from year-round public involvement, and population and harvest monitoring. The proposal to modify the 2018-2019 wolf hunting season was generated by the public (spring black bear hunters) for potential modifications to the 2018-2019 season. The proposal to modify the 2018-2019 wolf trapping seasons were generated by the public and submitted jointly by the Idaho Trapper's Association, Upper Snake River Trappers of Idaho, Intermountain Fur Harvesters, Foundation For Wildlife Management, East Idaho Houndsmen Association, Idaho Houndsmen Association, and Idaho Farm Bureau.

The proposals for changes to the 2018-2019 wolf trapping seasons were posted on the Department's website in early March and the wolf hunting season proposal was posted in mid-March to inform the public and provide an opportunity to provide input.

The Department received input from 765 individuals on the proposal to expand the wolf hunting seasons to April 30 in 48 GMUs in southern Idaho that have spring bear seasons. Eighteen percent (136) of respondents supported the proposals and expressed the opinion that Idaho has too many wolves and the season expansion would provide spring bear hunters an opportunity to take wolves. Eighty-two percent (622) opposed the proposal. The most sentiments expressed by those opposed were a concern that the April hunt would result in the direct or indirect killing of pups or nursing females and that wolves should not be killed regardless of method, location, or timing.

Of comments received on the Department's website regarding the trapping proposal, 46% (513) supported opening a new trapping season in the units Oct 1 – Mar 31 vs. 51% (572) opposed. Forty-six percent (507) of commenters also supported expanding the trapping season dates to start Oct 1 in the specified units vs. 50% (553) opposed. Supporters indicated there are too many wolves in the state and additional harvest opportunities are desirable. The primary reasons expressed for opposing the proposals included a general opposition to killing wolves, concern about the use of snares (including by hunting dog owners), and a feeling that Oct 1 was too early and would conflict with other users.

Several individuals addressed these topics at the Commission's public hearing on March 21.

Justification:

The Commission deferred action and further discussion on the proposals at their March meeting. This agenda item is provided at Commission request for discussion.
