Nature Center Notes

As many of us have discovered, it is often the small things that make the greatest impact. Here at the nature center, small things often yield amazing results. So it was this summer with our education booths.

These booths are small, simple, informal opportunities for visitors to learn. Set up in the nature center courtyard and staffed by Idaho Master Naturalist volunteers, the booths covered a wide variety of topics. Each booth offered hands-on elements to encourage engagement and provoke questions. Topics included Idaho's wild dogs and cats; horns and antlers; Idaho's mustelids; sagebrush ecosystems; Idaho's anadromous fishes; scat and tracks and more. Using a variety of props including pelts, skulls, mounts, plaster casts, bottled scat (seriously!), bouquets of sagebrush, popcorn fish "eggs," and much more, the tables were attractive and intriguing to visitors. Some folks would stop by for a quick look while others lingered to learn as much as they could. Rotating topics provided our return visitors with new opportunities each visit. Between June 1 and mid-August, 63 booths attracted 6,000 visitors!



I particularly enjoyed observing the interactions between volunteers and visitors. Each volunteer brought their own unique techniques to engaging visitors. They deftly juggled questions from children and adults, encouraging unsure visitors to touch props, sniff samples or guess what items might be. And they did

it all with a welcoming smile even when temperatures began to warm. Equally rewarding was seeing how much our volunteers enjoyed learning new things. They found great satisfaction in sharing their new knowledge with nature center visitors. Small things indeed yield large impacts!

First Day of Issue Ceremony

On Tuesday, July 9th the nature center had the honor of hosting the official dedication and national release of the United States Postal Service's Forever Frogs stamps---a First Day of Issue Ceremony. It began in January with an out-of-the-blue email inquiry from a postal official in Washington D.C. He explained the event, finishing with the query "Do you think MK Nature Center would be an appropriate venue?" "YES!!!" was our enthusiastic reply and after official approval from our agency, the Idaho Dept. of Fish and Game, we were off running or maybe hopping . . .

Nature center staff members learned a lot about philately and philatelists (ie. stamp collecting and stamp collectors) over the intervening months. We discovered that collectors travel great distances to attend these ceremonies and purchase newly released stamps, First Day Covers and other associated memorabilia. We also found out that being chosen as a ceremony location is quite an honor. We were thrilled and excited to show off our facility on the national postal stage.

The ceremony program speakers highlighted frogs, their vital ecological role and the importance they serve as gateway animals, introducing children to the wonders of the natural world. The 223 guests also learned about how stamp topics are selected and a bit about the history of stamps. Several chorus frogs were also in attendance and although they did not say much, received a lot of attention from some of the younger attendees and the media.

Overall, it was an exciting experience! The nature center staff enjoyed working closely with Postal Service colleagues in Washington, D.C. as well as locally. These folks provided important guidance and assistance in helping us make sure that frogs and their postal images were dedicated with a splash.

FALL Lecture Series at MK Nature Center-2019



Tuesday October 1st :Why is it *THAT* color? Dr. Terry Panhorst will share with us how mineral color in rocks is the *most* noticeable and *least* reliable characteristic for mineral identification. See examples of minerals and their color variations.

Monday, October 21st: Bird expert, Terry Rich will cover types of feeders and seeds, the value of water in winter, and other features that make a backyard attractive to birds. We'll also talk about how to identify the most common birds coming to feeders in the Boise area. Finally, we'll look at Project FeederWatch, one of the easiest bird data collection programs out there.

Wednesday, November 6th: Jan Shirley from Wiggly Composters will be here to help you learn about how and why to compost with Red Wigglers. Find out how to set up a worm compost pile, how to take care of it and why it is important! It is time to turn your food and paper waste into a valuable resource!

Monday, December 9th: Lance Davison will tell us about the Treasure Valley Canopy Network and show us how regional public-private partnerships are building collaborations that are having a lasting impact on the health and vitality of our urban forests and people. He will share information about the mission, current programs, and discuss how you can engage and support sustainable growth and improved environmental and human health throughout the Treasure Valley.

Lectures are designed for adults, are free, and open to the public. All lectures are 6:30-8 pm.





2020 Idaho Master Naturalist Class




