Non-Resident Tag Issuance Advisory Group (NRTIAG) MEETING MINUTES

July 25, 2024

Ellary TuckerWilliams, Legislative and Community Engagement Coordinator, welcomed everyone to the meeting at 9:00 am mountain time.

Members attending virtually included: Benn Brocksome, Ned Burns, Brad Compton, Michael Fuller, Mark Harris, Aaron Lieberman, James Petzke, Tyrel Stevenson, Mike Veile

IDFG staff in attendance included: Ellary TuckerWilliams, Tara Reichert, and Rick Ward

In compliance with open meeting law, members of the public had the opportunity to view the meeting virtually, through a Zoom meeting link.

Welcome and Orientation

Ellary TuckerWilliams

Ellary asked the NRTIAG members and IDFG staff to introduce themselves.

Ellary reminded NRTIAG members that, in compliance with Open Meeting Law, the virtual meeting was being streamed live to the public.

Ellary reviewed NRTIAG ground rules including:

- Be respectful of differing opinions
- Avoid interrupting
- Be present and engaged
- Stay on topic and be constructive with comments
- Ask questions, don't make assumptions
- Remember to "share the air"
- Everyone participates
- Recognize that everyone shares responsibility for the success the NRTIAG

Ellary asked the NRTIAG members if they were comfortable with IDFG posting their names, photos, and a brief bio to the NRTIAG webpage on the IDFG website for interested members of the public. Ellary also asked if the NRTIAG would be comfortable with receiving public comment. NRTIAG members expressed a desire for IDFG to create a process to receive all public feedback through the IDFG website to be summarized and distributed to members prior to each meeting.

NRTIAG Charter

Ellary reviewed the changes made to the NRTIAG Charter as requested during the previous meeting. Aaron Lieberman asked that a 6th sidebar be added, specifically related to maintaining outfitting industry due to its importance to Idaho’s rural economy. Members of the NRTIAG discussed the request at length and decided to direct IDFG to add language to the charter that highlighted the importance of guided and unguided non-resident hunters Idaho’s rural economy, outside of the 5 sideboards previously agreed to. IDFG was directed to make the respective change prior to the next meeting.

Follow-up on IDFG Staff Assignments

Ellary turned the floor over to Tara and Rick to review the previously requested supplemental information provided to the NRTIAG including:

 - 993 second elk tags
 - 1,210 second deer tags
- Summary of ID resident and NR hunter demographics
 - Resident
 - Approximately 17% female and 83% male as of 2023
 - Average male hunter age – 42
 - Average female hunter age – 36
 - Non-Resident
 - Approximately 4% female and 96% male as of 2023
 - Average male non-resident hunter age – 45
 - Average female non-resident hunter age - 37
- Cost comparison of ID tags to other western states

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Non-Resident Distribution - Mandatory Hunter Reporting

The following series of maps depict the distribution of non-residents who reported hunting via Mandatory Hunter Reporting survey data. Here the ‘percent’ depicted, is the ‘percent of total reporting non-residents’ for the given tag type.

Note that when reporting, hunters may report hunting in up to 3 units so a hunter may be counted multiple times in the case of our maps of deer tags.

The top five states with non-residents reporting having hunted with an Elk B Tag in 2019 were: Washington, California, Oregon, Wisconsin, and Minnesota.

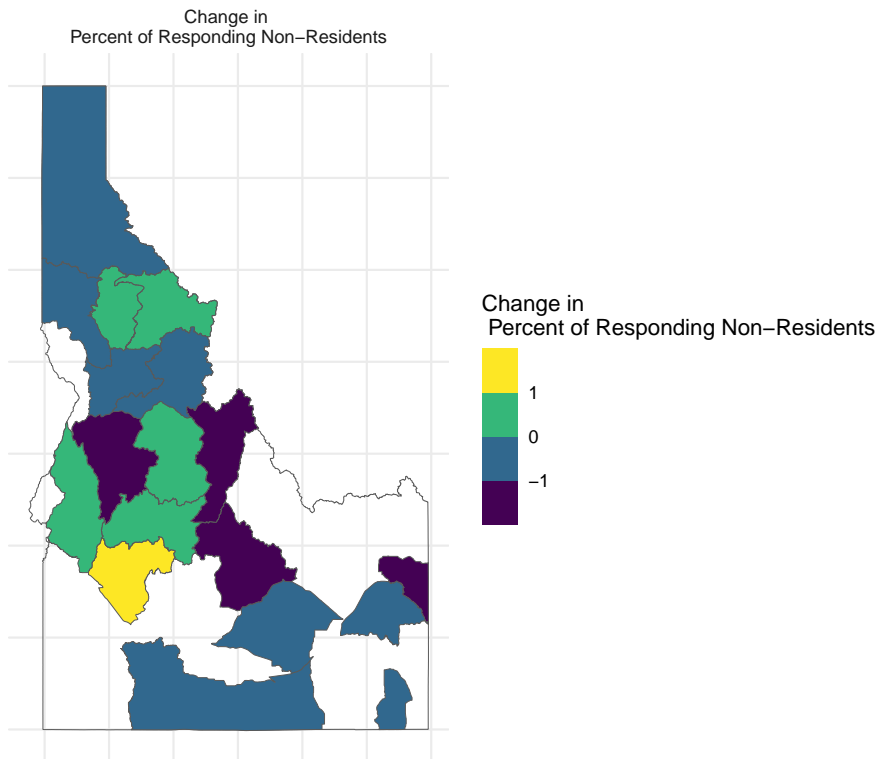
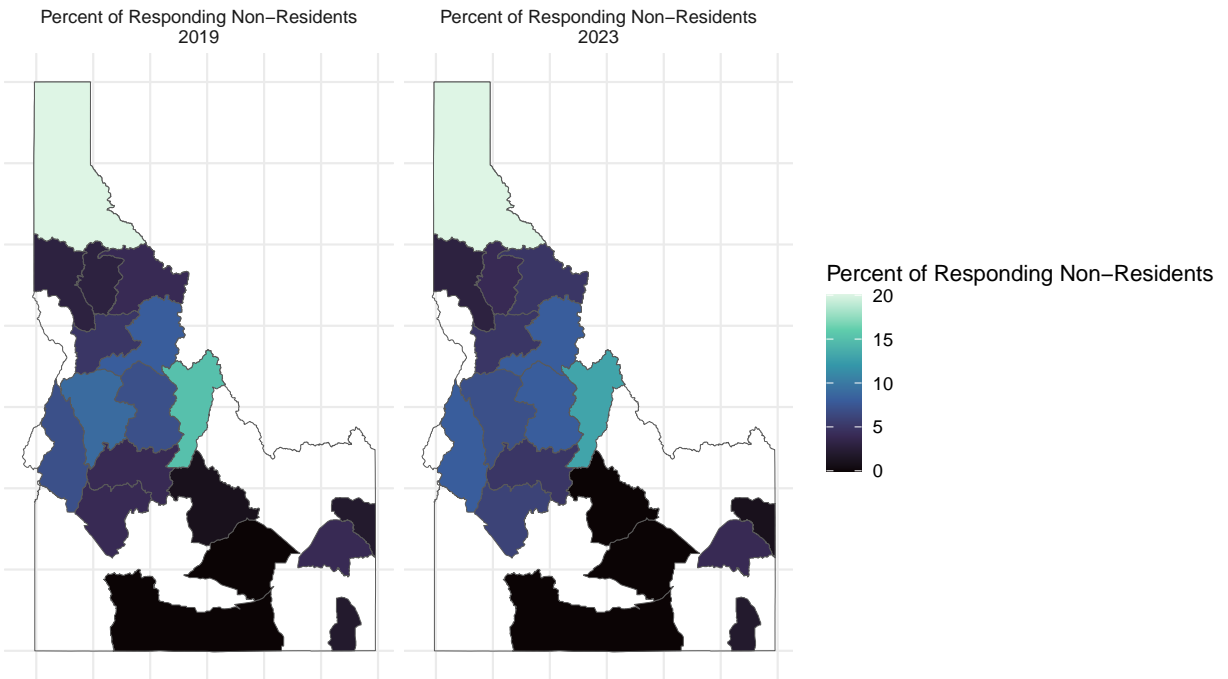

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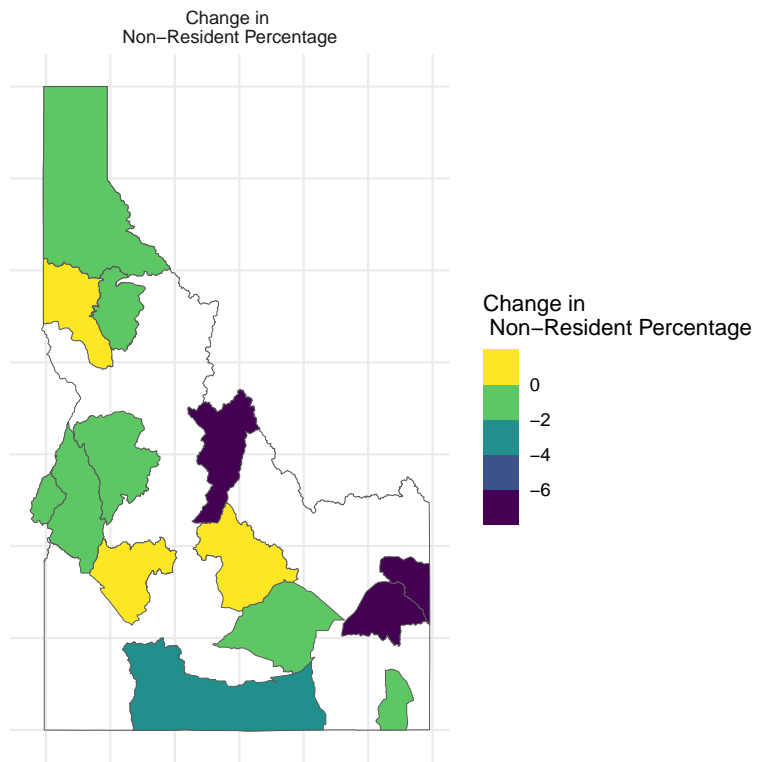
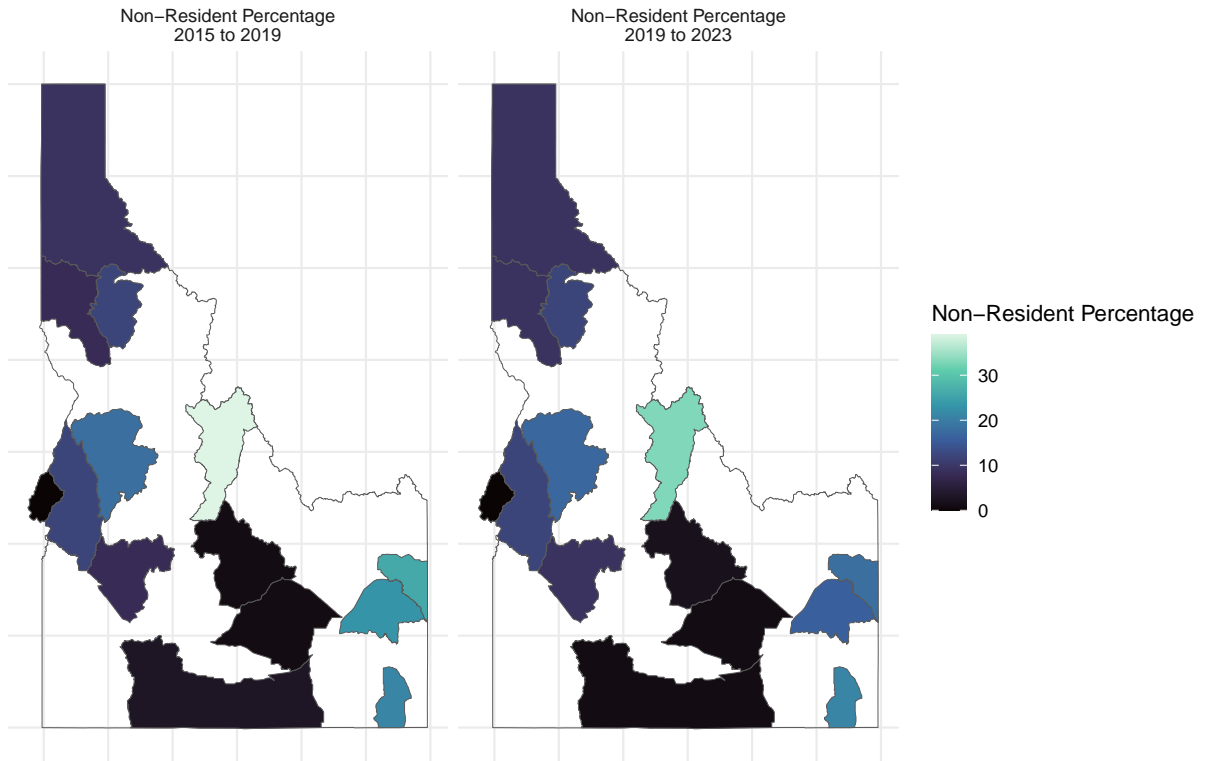
Percentage of Total Tags Used for Hunting Carried by Non-Residents

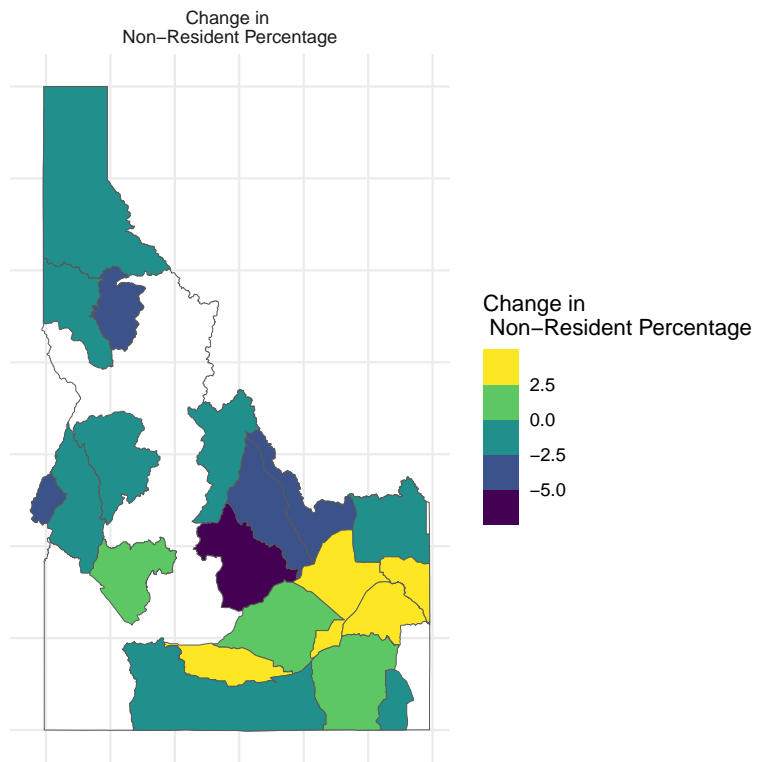
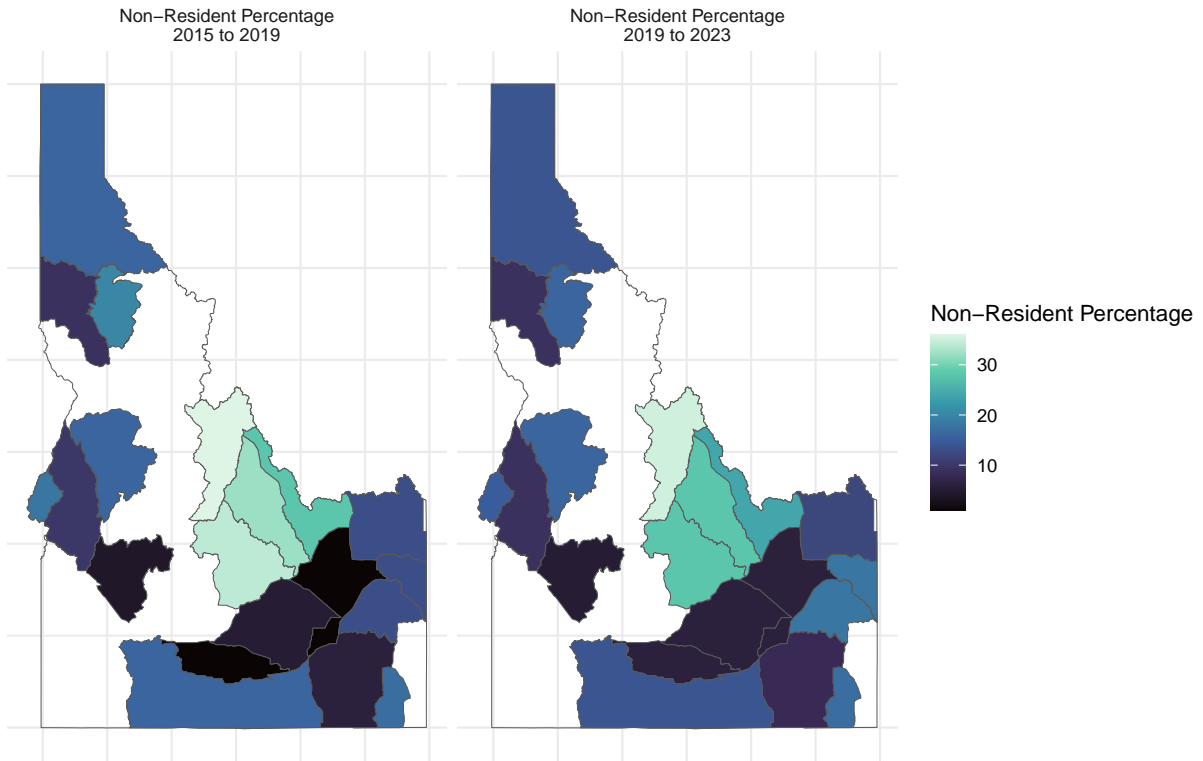

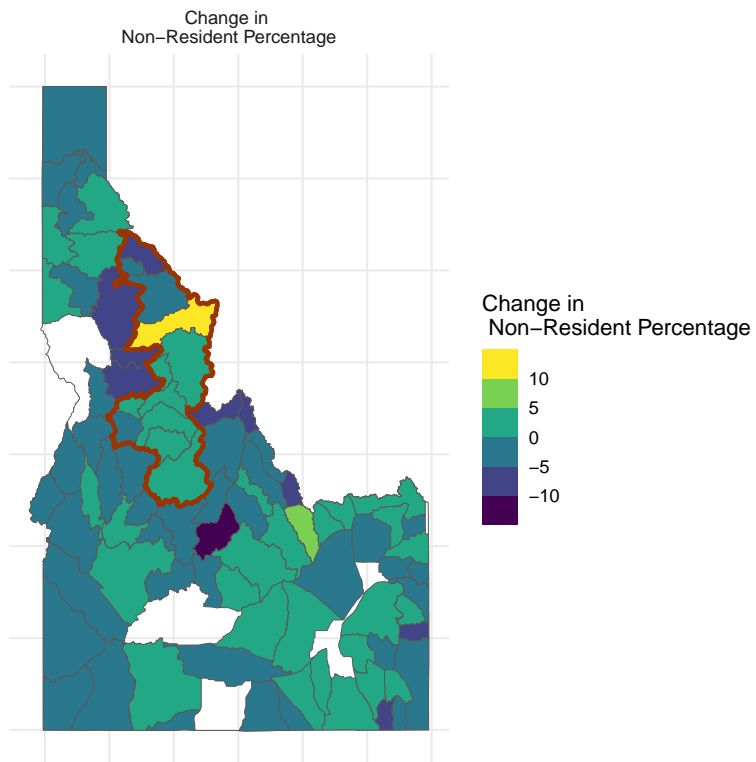
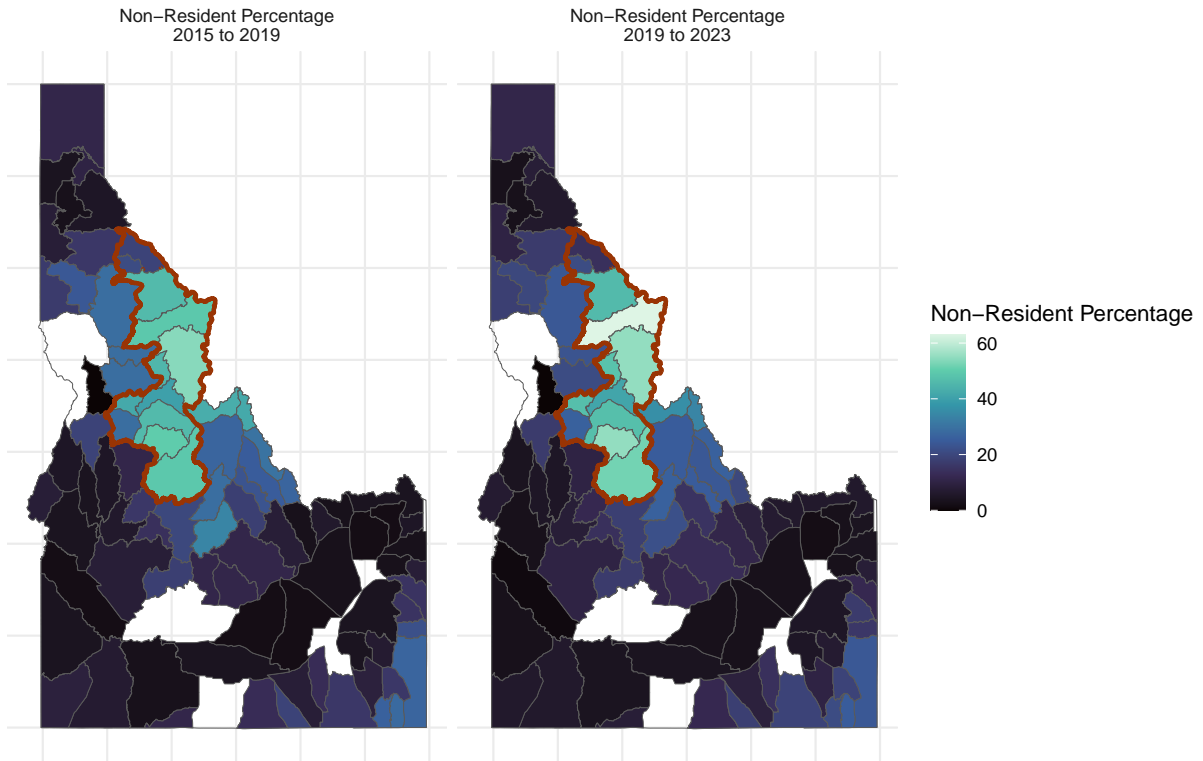
