






Q3: There is a larger percentage of hunters in the Snake River zone who have hunted for less than 10 years than the state average.






10. How important was each of the following in your decision to hunt during Elk archery, short-range weapons or muzzleloader seasons?







Q11: Harvest success rates for the Snake River zone has tended to be lower than the state average over the past 10 years.




Q12: Like other hunters in the state, most hunters in the Snake River zone would miss hunting Elk in Idaho a great deal, if they were no longer able to do so.

Could Not Hunt Reaction








Q17: Similar to the state average, over half of Snake River hunters perceive Elk numbers to have declined abruptly in the zone, resulting in scarcity.





Q20: The Pioneer zone has been hunted the longest among respondents. The Snake River zone itself ranks second in duration.



22. What do you believe is the primary factor limiting Elk numbers in the zone you hunted in 2011? (Check only ONE response)







24. If YES, would you be willing to pay a higher fee (\$100 more for non-residents; \$30 more for residents) to do so? (Please check one response)













Q27: The response distribution is similar between the state average and the Snake River zone. More hunters in this zone find cow Elk or any Elk more desirable than the state average.


28. Below is a list of possible reasons for hunting Elk in Idaho. How important to you is each of the following reasons for hunting Elk in Idaho?



IMPORTANCE OF REASONS FOR HUNTING ELK IN IDAHO












Cow Every Year vs. Spike Every Year








Q38: Unlike the state average, about 15% more hunters from the Snake River zone did not favor this regulation but still found it acceptable.










Area Where Wolves are Not Present

Area Where Can Also Hunt Wolves




Q30: The response distribution is similar between the state average and the Snake River zone. Weekdays are preferred by both groups.








IMPORTANCE OF ATTRIBUTES FOR A QUALITY ELK HUNTING EXPERIENCE IN IDAHO











Being Able to Hung Elk Using OHV






Q33: Similar to the state average, threequarters of Snake River hunters said that the number of other hunters did not detract from the quality of Elk hunting experience.


Number of Hunters Detracted From Quality of Experience






39. How do Wolves affect your Idaho Elk hunting experience? (Please circle one response for each item)

40. Do you anticipate Elk numbers to increase now that Idaho Fish and Game is responsible for managing wolves? (*Please check one response*)





Q40: Like other hunters in the state, Snake River hunters anticipate increasing Elk numbers with IDFG management of Wolves.
