- Maximum number of people per 1.5 hour program is 50 (including chaperones, unless otherwise arranged).
- Groups under 10 people will be charged for 10 people.
- Suggested chaperone ratio of 1 adult for every 10 students.
- Scheduling is first come, first served, no more than 5 months in advance.

Stream Walk Program-Tour the Nature Center

This is the most popular nature center program - the perfect introduction to **habitat, adaptations, niche, food webs, and lifecycles** focusing on animals of Idaho. With the use of pelts, skulls, and animal mounts, a wildlife educator gives students an introductory lesson. Outside, students look underwater and through the forest to learn about wildlife habitat in Idaho.

PreK-Adult. 1.5 hours. \$2.00/student \$2.00/parent chaperones. Teachers/School Staff free.

Hoo lives in Idaho?

Owls are amazing hunters. Some owls call the nature center their home! Take a look at owl skulls, wings, and feet, and learn about how owls are adapted to hunt at night. Dissect owl pellets to see exactly what they ate.

1-8th grade. 1.5 hours. \$2.50/person.

Anadro-WHAT?

This in-depth program covers the life cycle of anadromous fishes and discusses the causes of the decline of these amazing fish. A great lesson on aquatic ecology and life cycles.

1-12th grade. 1.5 hour. \$2.50/person.

Scat and Tracks

Become a wildlife detective! Learn how to identify wildlife by what they leave behind: tracks, scat, and much more! Test your tracking skills on a wildlife walk through the nature center. Make a plaster track to take home.

1-6th grade. 1.5 hours. \$2.50/person.

Nature's Engineers-Beavers!

Look for evidence of beaver activity at the nature center. Learn about beaver adaptations and why they are important to aquatic systems. Build a beaver dam!

PreK-6th grade. 1.5 hours. \$2.50/person.

Wildlife Scientist

Learn about different kinds of scientists, what they do, and how they do it. Become a scientist and use the scientific method to answer a question.

K-6th grade. 1.5 hours. \$2.50/person.

Wild Canines

Idaho is home to three species of *canines*, the red fox, coyote and the grey wolf. Learn about their habitat, similarities and differences.

K-12th grade. 1.5 hours. \$2.50/person.

“Dinosaur” Fish of Idaho

Discover the secrets of the deep by diving into the life of a white sturgeon. These ancient creatures swam the waters during the time of the dinosaurs, and they still swim in our waters today! See live white sturgeon in the pond and learn how they have lived on the earth for so long.

1-12th. 1.5 hours. \$2.50/person.

Bears of Idaho

Meet the black bear and the grizzly bear, two of Idaho's residents. How are they different and how are they the same? Learn how bears live their amazing lives in Idaho.

K-6th grade. 1.5 hours. \$2.50/person.

Class in the Creek

Get in the Boise River! Provided boots and nets will help you collect aquatic insects of all kinds. Learn about why these macroinvertebrates are important in an aquatic food chain. *Water levels and seasonal temperatures dictate the availability of this program.*

4th grade-adult. 1.5 hours. \$2.50/person.

Adaptation Artistry

Learn about local birds and all the amazing survival features they have. Find animals at the nature center and discover what adaptations Artistically create your own animal with its own set of adaptations to survive in its unique habitat.
